<u>Dedication Sunday is scheduled for November 18th</u>. In addition to dedicating your monetary gifts during the worship service, prayerfully consider the ways in which you can give of your time and talents. Consider volunteering to serve as a Sunday morning Liturgist (Lay Leader), ushering,

### ALBUQUERQUE HEALTHCARE FOR THE HOMELESS

HOMELESSNESS WILL MAKE YOU SICK AND CAN KILL YOU

The statistics are grim. In the City of Albuquerque, more than 1,400 reported homelessness on January 23, 2017. According to the New Mexico Coalition to End Homelessness, at least 16,000 persons – 2.3% of Bernalillo County residents – will experience homelessness during the year.

For over three decades, Albuquerque Health Care for the Homeless (AHCH) has served our community as the only health care organization in Central New Mexico dedicated exclusively to providing services to homeless people. When people experience homelessness, access to adequate health care can mean the difference between getting back on your feet or dying. AHCH believes all people are entitled to health care, including those living in cars or motels, couch surfing, on the street, in shelters and in transitional housing. Having access to medical care for chronic conditions like diabetes, high blood pressure, chronic pain, is essential.

AHCH provides critical services to over 7,000 men, women and children every year. By addressing the health-related causes of homelessness, AHCH makes it possible for people to find solutions to end their homelessness.

While the needs are many, Second Presbyterian Church is focusing on a collection of towels and stockings for men, women and children, during the Advent Season. The clinic Resources Center has showers for the homeless and towels are always in demand. For folks who are out on the street all day, a fresh pair of socks is a treasure. ### **WORSHIP AND MUSIC**

All Saints Day November 4th. The liturgical color for this service is *White*. As in previous years, images of loved ones who have passed since last November will be projected and memorialized during the service. If a loved one has passed since last November, you are invited to bring photos to the office well before the 4th. All are invited to bring photos of those who have been remembered from previous years. These will be placed on tables at the front of the sanctuary and become part of our celebration of the cloud of witnesses who have enriched our lives.

A Healing Service will be a part of worship on November 11 as we prepare for the holidays. Scripture strongly affirms ministries of spiritual healing. Through such healing, God works to bring about reconciliation between God and humanity, among individuals and communities, within each person, and between humanity and the rest of creation. The New Testament records that Jesus himself healed the sick and sent out his disciples on ministries of healing.

Those who minister spiritual healing are channels of God's love. A Service of Healing is not necessarily a service of curing, but it provides an atmosphere in which healing can happen. Anointing with oil shows the power of touch, and is an act invoking the healing love of God. The oil points beyond itself and those doing the anointing to the action of the Holy Spirit and the presence of the healing Christ, who is God's Anointed One. **Christ the King Sunday November 25** Christ the King Sunday celebrates the full authority of Christ as King and Lord of the universe. Officially called "The Feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King," it is celebrated with Holy Communion on the final Sunday of Ordinary Time, the Sunday before Advent. The color of the banners for this celebration is changed from the *Green* of ordinary time to *White*. By the next week we will be entering the season of Advent when the color will be *Purple*.

### **DOCTRINE OF DISCOVERY**

Repudiating the "Doctrine of Discovery" will help the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) address the harm of past injustices and inform the denomination in its future mission work, a Presbyterian human rights attorney said Tuesday.

The "discovery" doctrine led to abuses generations ago that continue to traumatize Native Americans, June Lorenzo said in an address during the Native American Consulting Committee dinner. A member of Laguna United Presbyterian Church in Santa Fe Presbytery, she served on the team that produced the Doctrine of Discovery report to be received by the PC(USA) General Assembly this week.

The doctrine originated as a papal teaching that European countries used to justify their colonization of other parts of the world. It also played a role in the westward expansion of the United States, and large numbers of Native Americans lost their land, and their lives, as a result. Lorenzo said Native American women and children often were sexually abused by military personnel.

"It is no wonder that we have more and more native scholars who say that you cannot leave intergenerational trauma out of the picture" when considering the plight of Native Americans, she observed.

The General Assembly is being asked to urge Presbyterians to repudiate the doctrine and confess their complicity in it. Lorenzo reminded the gathering that the rights of indigenous people is an issue that goes beyond the borders of the United States. She said the PC(USA) should always be concerned about justice for indigenous people as it pursues its international mission work.

### **Background:**

The 222nd General Assembly (2016) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) called the church to confess its complicity and repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery. The action also called for a review of the history of the doctrine and the writing of a report on the doctrine.

The Doctrine of Discovery was first articulated in 1452 by Pope Nicholas V as the Papal Bull "Dum Diversas" and in 1496 by King Henry VII of England as a patent granted to John Cabot, which *authorized and justified the destruction, killing, and appropriating of the lands of indigenous peoples and nations.* The Doctrine of Discovery was incorporated into U.S. law in the 19th century when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in the case, *Johnson vs McIntosh*, 1823, stating that European nations had assumed dominion over the lands of America upon discovery and as a result Native Americans had lost their rights to complete sovereignty as independent nations



and retained a mere right of occupancy in their lands. A U.S. Supreme Court case as recent as 2005, City of Sherrill v. Oneida Nation of Indians, utilized the Doctrine of Discovery as legal precedent for the final decision. This doctrine laid the groundwork for the genocide of indigenous peoples around the world; the colonization of Africa, Asia, Australia, the Pacific Islands, and the Americas; and the transatlantic trafficking in persons used as slave labor.
