Of **Minimal** Importance

Queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo,

Our Lenten theme for this year is spiritual minimalism. Some of you are aware of the current minimalist movement in our country and in other places in the world. It is predicated on the notion of ridding ourselves of an over-abundance of material things. Our living and work spaces, and even our cars can collect clutter. And when we consciously remove many if not most of our material items (we may not even use), it can organize our priorities and lead to greater happiness. One definition for minimalism is: "a tool to rid yourself of life's excess in favor of focusing on what's important—so you can find happiness, fulfillment, and freedom," (From Joshua Fields Millburn & Ryan Nicodemus's website called The Minimalists, https://www.theminimalists.com/minimalism/).

Similarities exists between that minimalism and the way our spirituality functions. In the rapid flow of our lives—our experiences and relationships, our minds and hearts begin accumulating too many things to process. Our pursuits, worries, desires, hang-ups, traumas, hopes, dreams, and so many more things clutter our souls. This leads to distractions that block out or cloud our spiritual lives and prevents them from leading to contentment, fulfillment, and freedom in our relationships with God and each other.

We will kick off Lent on Ash Wednesday, March 6, 7pm in our sanctuary, with our friends and partners in mission from First Presbyterian Church. That evening we will begin our faithful Lenten pursuit of spiritual minimalism. This liturgical season will provide invitation, guided by our worship, to consider what we might let go of, and how me might free up space in our minds and hearts for God's presence. We will conduct a spiritual inventory and identify what holds us back as individuals and as a community from living a more focused and fruitful spiritual life? The route will lead to Calvary, where Christ empties himself completely only to find new life and purpose that will change the universe forever. I look forward to journeying through Lent with you very soon. I trust it will be a significant season in which we embrace "minimal" importance! Or better stated, the importance of minimalism.



The Doctrine of Discovery

in 1823, the landmark case Johnson v, M'Intosh, Chief Justice Marshall traced English title to land in America to the "discovery" of America by the Italian explorer John Cabot, acting pursuant to Letters Patent issued in 1496 by King Henry



DOCTRINE OF DISCOVERY

The Doctrine of Discovery was first articulated in 1452 by Pope Nicholas V as the Papal Bull "Dum Diversas" and in 1496 by King Henry VII of England as a patent granted to John Cabot, which *authorized and justified the destruction, KILLING, and appropriating of the lands of indigenous peoples and nations.*

The 222nd General Assembly (2016) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) called the church to confess its complicity and repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery. The action also called for a review of the history of the doctrine and the writing of a report on the doctrine.

Your Session has been reviewing the Doctrine Of Discovery, and in Special Meeting on February 2, 2019, we unanimously passed this resolution:

"The Session of Second repudiates the Doctrine of Discovery. We confess our complicity in the injustice of the Doctrine and promise to: (1) educate our congregation on the history and implications of the Doctrine; (2) work with higher councils to reinforce proliferation of repudiation to other Sessions and higher councils; and (3) cultivate relationships with Native American individuals and tribes, and especially Native American congregations."

Please review the resources provided by the General Assembly on the Doctrine of Discovery (posted on the Facing Racism website: https://facing-racism.pcusa.org/item/41901/), and lift up histories of Indigenous peoples and current issues facing Indigenous peoples.


We are very thankful to Ruth Montoya for her dedication and leadership in chairing the Stewardship and Finance committee. As we move forward we will continue with the Stewardship campaign of "Harvesting our Gifts", using every talent, expertise and generous contribution from each of our members.

As we reported in our annual report, expanded on by Pastor Rob in our congregational meeting, our budget is in deficit. We have a challenge to meet. Our church community is resilient, dedicated and generous. We will rise to the challenge and find ways to resolve our deficit. We as a Christian community will get through this. Our program and mission are strong and you have shown support for what is taking place in our church as evidenced by your increase in pledges.

Every Session member has already agreed to increase their pledge for 2019. We encourage all members to increase their pledge by whatever amount they can afford. Please do not interpret this suggestion as pressure to do so. If you choose to increase, please include a pledge card/note so that the committee can plan accordingly. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.

The current situation is simple. Our church (home) is going through the same needs and expenses as do all homes. However, our income is not meeting spending. Thus, we need to see if we can increase income, because projected needs for the coming year include both air conditioning and furnace repairs or replacements.

I think we can make an analogy between our predicament and the sermon on "Tough Love" Pastor Rob shared with us on Sunday Feb. 5th, in which he described "agape" love (Greek) that cares about the well-being of others. It relies on sacrifice and patience and is most altruistic. He stated that the underlying assumption of "Tough Love" is a good thing. It teaches us some of the most important lessons and truths we will learn in our lives. We can use this message to inspire us into coming together and allowing our almighty God to lead us through this challenge.



This chart shows our Income, Spending, Operating Reserves, and Capital Reserves for 2012-2018.

Because of our commitment to program and facility, spending has outpaced income, and we have met the deficit by using funds from Reserves.

We have sufficient funds to meet the projected 2019 deficit, but prefer not to continue to expend from Reserves. Reserves are intended to be used for unforeseen and required large expenditures.


