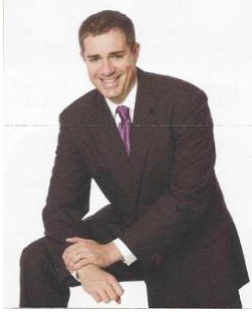

A Holy Week Invitation

Queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo,

Faith is often portrayed in popular culture as belief in doctrine. But doctrine is not faith. Doctrine is a human effort to codify and make sense of sacred narratives. If our faith was simply downloading doctrine to our brains and then saying we believe it, that would not lead to vitality or deeper connection with God. Faith is most authentic not when it is stored in our minds, but lived with our lives. It is living and experiencing God through sacred narrative in the present. And over the course of our lives, our faith actions and experiences end up professing more about what we believe than our words. We've all heard the saying about actions being louder than words.

You are invited this month to live Holy Week faith! The invitation is not to sit in the pew and passively receive doctrine. It is an invitation to experience the sacred narrative of the most important week of our faith. Palm Sunday, April 14, come wave palms, shout Hosannah, and accompany Jesus during his triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Come relieve the experience of Jesus preparing for the end of his earthly journey. On Maundy Thursday, April 18, 6pm, come gather in the upper room with Jesus and the disciples. Come partake in his last supper and have your feet washed, a humble act of love Jesus demonstrates that evening.

On Good Friday, April 19, 7pm, come watch and listen as our choir sings with the Risen Savior Catholic Church choir and musicians. Relive the darkest day of our faith with a stirring rendition of St. John's Passion and let the narrative in to your heart. And then, on Easter Sunday, April 21, come sing Alleluia! If you come to the 7am sunrise service in the Peace Garden, come see the empty tomb with your own eyes and celebrate the good news of resurrection with the community. And/or come worship with us at 10:30am to the bellowing sound of mariachi music embodying the joy of the day in which our savior conquers death. Watch the flower cross processed into the sanctuary proclaiming Jesus' resurrection.

Around the word, Holy Week is more participatory than much of the rest of the Christian year. It often involves processions and active participation. The reason is to help us live into resurrection. Resurrection is something we best experience rather than simply say we believe.

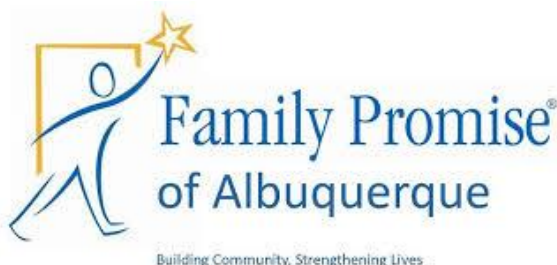

DOCTRINE OF CHRISTIAN DOMINATION

The 222nd General Assembly (2016) of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) called the church to confess its complicity and repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery. This “doctrine” is also known as, and better described as, the “Doctrine of Christian Domination.” **Juan López de Palacios Rubios** (1450–1524) was the editor of the "requirimiento" that bears his name, read during the conquest of America to the Indians, instructing the Indians to submit peacefully. In the text they informed the natives that they were vassals of the Castilian monarch and subjects of the Pope and, if they oppose they would be subjected by force and turned into slaves. Every time it was explained, it was explained in Latin or Spanish.

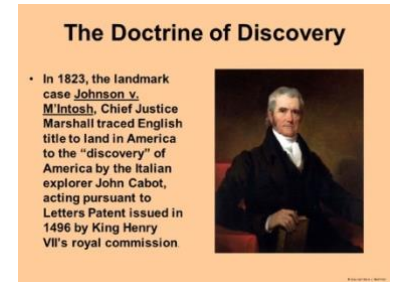
Eight persons from the Presbytery of Santa Fe attended Winter Talk 2019 held at Phillips Theological Seminary, February 25-27, in Tulsa, OK. Winter Talk is a three-day conversation on the Christian Doctrine of Discovery and its influence on Christian theology and polity, with an emphasis on the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) relationship with Indigenous tribes and peoples. Hosted by the Yakama Christian Mission Council, and Phillips Theological Seminary, Winter Talk is dedicated to furthering the conversation on the Christian Doctrine of Discovery and its dismantling.

Some of the attendees from the Presbytery of Santa Fe witnessed to the effects of the Boarding Schools, which they experienced first-hand. Children were typically immersed in European-American culture through forced changes that removed indigenous cultural signifiers. These methods included being forced to have European-American style haircuts, being forbidden to speak their [Indigenous languages](#), and having their real names replaced by European names to both "civilize" and "Christianize" them. The experience of the schools was usually harsh and often deadly, especially for the younger children who were forcibly separated from their families. The children were forced to abandon their Native American identities and cultures. Investigations of the later twentieth century have revealed many documented cases of sexual, manual, physical and mental abuse occurring mostly in church-run schools.

The Doctrine of Discovery was first articulated in 1452 by Pope Nicholas V as the Papal Bull “Dum Diversas” and in 1496 by King Henry VII of England as a patent granted to John Cabot, which **authorized and justified the destruction, KILLING, and appropriating of the lands of indigenous peoples and nations.**

FINANCING A YEAR AS YAV - Part 4 in a Series

Hey ya'll, it's me, Lauren LaMonica, your favorite Second Pres YAV! For this month's article about the YAV we were going to talk a little bit about finance and what it actually takes to "fund" a YAV year. As I am quite sure ya'll are aware of what YAV stands for but as a refresher it stands for Young Adult Volunteer, which essentially means young women and men between the ages of 19-30 can give a year of their life to service to a community that is willing to have them come and assist. Our service can be in about 20 different locations national and international.

What a lot of people don't actually realize is that there is a lot of fundraising to actually become a YAV. The average cost to send a YAV into a year of service is about \$22,000. So, fundraising is a very, very, important aspect in being able to become a YAV. We are not required to raise all of that. I reiterate we are not REQUIRED to raise all of that funding, but we are each required to raise 4,000 personally for the program. And, we do a bunch of group fundraising for each site. In doing so we ask our home churches, the community that has watched us grow and have been on this faith-based journey alongside us. Also, the different work placements we are assigned to also make a donation to the program for our service for that year.



As a volunteer we do not get paid, but we get a financial stipend to help with our gas/travel/food expenses. Most of the sites provide housing, but if not, then the stipend is increased to compensate what you would have to pay for rent/bills. The \$22,000 also helps cover our health insurance and basic living necessities. There is an assistance program to help with student loans as most of the YAVs are fresh out of college. Each individual YAV site relies significantly on their Presbytery and the community in which the YAVs will be immersed. Donations are always accepted and welcomed! As a second year YAV, I can 100% tell you I would not have been able to do this program for two year without the amazing finical contributions I have been blessed enough to receive, not only from my home community but also the one I made in my first year in Montana. With these generous funds I have been able to better understand my path that God wanted me to take, which involves going back to school and finishing my degree and becoming a youth director within the church.

Worship and Music

Holy Week celebration will begin with a Palm Sunday drama depicting Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. Later in the week there will be a commemoration of the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday, which leads to Jesus' crucifixion on Good Friday. That evening service will feature the choirs of Second and Risen Savior Roman Catholic Church in a Tenebrae service.

Holy Week will culminate on Easter Sunday in the joyful remembrance of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. A Sunrise Service at 7am in the Quíñones Peace Garden will begin the day of celebration, followed by Easter brunch before the regular worship service at 10:30am. Those attending the 10:30am service will be greeted by a mariachi band and will have the opportunity to place a blossom on the floral cross that will become part of our worship celebration.

Liturgical Colors

The liturgical colors of the Christian year are *white* for special days or seasons of the redemptive work of Jesus Christ. *Purple* marks the season of penitence and preparation. *Red* is the color for Pentecost. *Green* is used for all other time periods called Ordinary Time.

Ash Wednesday was the beginning of the Lenten Season: a period of preparation and repentance and is represented by the color purple. Liturgical colors enhance the meaning of our worship services in the weeks to come through Holy Week, or remain bare (although a few churches will use black for Good Friday). On Easter Sunday the liturgical color will be white to begin the Easter Season. White will persist through the remainder of April, May and the first week in June, until the red of Pentecost Sunday.

Help Wanted:

Flowers for worship service: A new sign-up sheet is posted in the Fellowship Hall where you can choose a date to bring flowers for the service. It is our tradition that flowers for the worship service have been provided by friends and members of the church to honor a person or event of significance, such the memory of a departed loved one, or an anniversary. Flowers should be delivered well before the beginning of the service.

Missing Vases: The mates of several of our paired vases have wandered off. One was returned last month, but is once again missing. If found, please put them in the kitchen by the triple sinks.

Hospitality: Fellowship is an important element of our church community. The gatherings after worship for coffee and conversation are in need of assistance to provide food and help with set-up and clean up on Sunday mornings. A sign-up sheet is posted in the Fellowship Hall where you can choose a date to contribute to this valuable ministry. For questions, contact Ella Porragas or Sandra Duran.

WELCOMING THE STRANGER: DIFFICULT AND NECESSARY

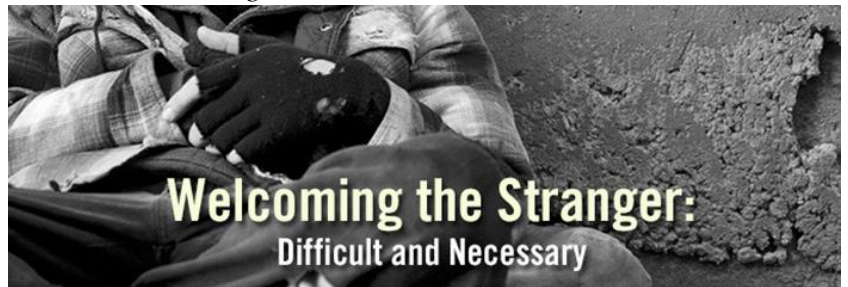

The world is a demanding and fragile place and we, as Christians carry responsibilities for both.

Demanding: asylum seekers arriving in Albuquerque needing shelter, food, comfort and assistance in travel arrangements. These individuals have been granted the right to seek asylum in the United States, have sponsors, but need to make travel arrangements. After their hearings, they are released from detention (with monitoring anklets); the asylum seekers coming to Albuquerque are an overflow from Annunciation House in El Paso, Texas. This ministry of compassion was unable to handle the increase of seekers released following the government shut-down – they reached out to sister organizations in Albuquerque and now there are five congregations (Catholic, Protestant and Jewish) responding by providing shelter and organizing volunteers to feed, assist and transport to buses and airport.

Response: *As Christians we are called to welcome the stranger and at Second Presbyterian we are responding by preparing meals and providing snacks to groups of 50 – 100 adults and families receiving the hospitality of Catholic Charities in Albuquerque. This response began through the Wednesday Adult Bible Study and the Choir, but has been adopted by the Session and assigned to the Mission Committee.*

Fragile: there is no certainty regarding how long such a program will be needed – perhaps for weeks, perhaps for a couple of months or perhaps it will end tomorrow. However, in the past three weeks, Albuquerque has received, cared for and processed to sponsors' destinations 300-600 Asylum Seekers weekly – all being cared for by volunteers.



Response: *Second Presbyterian has pledged to provide one dinner and/or snacks each week until... We calculate that dinner and snacks cost about \$160 for 50 (\$3.20 per person), with some supplies donated. We have funds to cover about a month of meals. If you would like to contribute or assist with serving (Spanish preferable) you are encouraged to do so. Make out checks to Second Presbyterian and designate Mission/Asylum seekers; for cash donations use the giving envelopes in the pews and designate Mission/Asylum seekers. If you would like to volunteer, please contact Kay Huggins at kay.huggins@me.com or 505 301 4813. If this particular response stops, your Mission Committee will redirect funds to another similar project in our demanding and fragile world. Thank you for your compassion and prayers.*

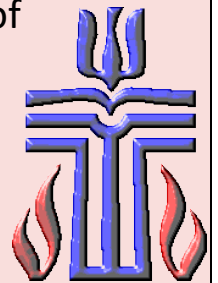
