HEALTHCARE FOR THE HOMELESS

HOMELESSNESS WILL MAKE YOU SICK AND CAN KILL YOU The statistics are grim. In the City of Albuquerque, more than 1,400 reported homelessness on January

23, 2017. According to the New Mexico Coalition to End Homelessness, at least 16,000 persons – 2.3% of Bernalillo County residents – will experience homelessness during the year.

For over three decades, Albuquerque Health Care for the Homeless (AHCH) has served our community as the only health care organization in Central New Mexico dedicated exclusively to providing services to homeless people. When people experience homelessness, access to adequate health care can mean the difference between

getting back on your feet or dying. AHCH believes all people are entitled to health care, including those living in cars or motels, couch surfing, on the street, in shelters and in transitional housing. Having access to medical care for chronic conditions like diabetes, high blood pressure, chronic pain, is essential.

AHCH provides critical services to over 7,000 men, women and children every year. By addressing the health-related causes of homelessness, AHCH makes it possible for people to find solutions to end their homelessness. While the needs are many, Second Presbyterian Church is focusing on a collection of towels and stockings for men, women and children, during the Advent Season. The clinic Resources Center has showers for the homeless and towels are always in demand. For folks who are out on the street all day, a fresh pair of socks is a treasure. Please put bath towels and socks on your holiday shopping list for the homeless. For questions or further information contact Pat Bixby.

In December 2018 the Sunday School classes of Second (that means all the children) decided that we would save up the money from our weekly collection, for two months. At the end of the two months, we decided what we wanted to buy to donate to Health Care For The Homeless. We collected around \$75.00 (with great help from the teachers) and bought 60 men and women socks and 100 toothbrushes (see the picture!). Our children felt a sense of accomplishment and were very happy with their choice.

During the Advent Season, Second delivered an impressive collection of stockings, towels and other items of winter clothing to Albuquerque Health Care for the Homeless (ACHC). These items were gratefully received by ACHC for distribution to the clientele of the agency. Our donation was followed up, by eight members of our church, with a tour of the ACHC campus on 2nd Street. During the tour we learned about the array of programs to promote the end of homeless for the people served by the agency. These include medical, dental, and behavioral health clinics, a harm reduction program, document replacement, and a social center where folks can get questions answered by a caring staff.

FAMILY PROMISE

Family Promise of Albuquerque is a local affiliate of a national organization, Interfaith Hospitality Network. Nationally, Family Promise has been providing shelter for families experiencing homelessness for over 25 years and has 182 affiliates. Family Promise of Albuquerque has provided shelter for over 400 families and has about a 70 percent success rate of helping families find housing within 90 days of entering our shelter program.

DISPENSARIO MÉDICO y DENTAL DE SERVICIO SOCIAL CRISTO REY

Since 2005, Doctor Mendoza ministers to the poor in Juárez by providing health services to the most vulnerable. La Clínica Cristo Rey is located in the Anapra colony in Juárez. In addition to direct treatment of patients, Dr. Mendoza educates families about safety, healthy lifestyles and oral hygiene. The clinic has one doctor, two medical assistants and one dentist.

La Clínica Cristo Rey has treated more than 3,500 medical patients and 2,800 dental patients living in makeshift colonias surrounding the city.

The Clinic also continues to treat patients who have been deported from the United States and have no means with which to cover their medical or dental expenses. The clinic also serves immigrants that reach the border in poor state of physical and/or dental health. These patients receive first aid or basic medical care, water and clothing. It serves many mothers with young children, pregnant women and the elderly. Many immigrants, while traveling, have not been able to have oral care for months and come to the clinic and receive free dental care.

This ministry also assists around 90 students in all grade levels (elementary through university) with school scholarships that go towards paying a portion of public school tuition, uniforms and classroom materials. In order to receive these scholarships, students must maintain a 90% average and have no absences.

The clinic is solely supported by contributions from churches, non-profit organizations in the US, and the Cristo Rey Lutheran Church in El Paso. The First Methodist Church in El Paso helps provide for diabetes detecting materials and some equipment for handicap adults.

Funding and materials donated for the clinic can be taken to the Cristo Rey Church in El Paso and the church staff will take it directly to the Clinic in Juarez. Please make checks for donations in the name of: Cristo Rey Lutheran Church and under purpose please write: **DISPENSARIO MÉDICO y DENTAL DE SERVICIO SOCIAL CRISTO REY.**

Please attach a letter designating any donations to the Clinic.

The clinic is currently in desperate need for: Funding to help support the salaries for the 2 assistants for the Doctor; \$50.00/week for each assistant (need funding for the next 6 months); Funding to purchase materials and



equipment; Baby and children's clothes; Disposable diapers and sanitary wipes; A&D ointment; Woman and men's underwear (new please), T-shirts, long pants; Cold Compresses; Hot Packs; Nebulizers; Gloves, Non-Latex; Hand Sanitizer; Cotton balls; Alcohol Wipes; Alcohol; Bandages + Band-Aids; Gauze; Tape; Tweezers; Bandage dressings; Adhesive bandages; Rapid Strep Test Kits; Urinalysis Test Kits; ACE Wraps; Crutches; Finger Splints; SAM Splints.

Please make sure medications are not expired:



Medications to treat fever in children; Children's allergy medicine; Pediatric Fluid and Electrolyte Therapy; Asthma inhalers; Medicines for gas pain (Mylanta, Gas-X); Medicines for heartburn-antacids or acid reducer (Pepcid AC, Zantac 75); Medicines for constipation, mild stool softeners and laxatives; Medicines for cramping from diarrhea, medicines that have loperamide (Imodium) or bismuth subsalicylate (Kaopectate or Pepto-Bismol); Pain relievers-Acetaminophen (Tylenol), Ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin); Allergy Medicines-Diphenhydramine (Benadryl); Burn Wrap; Burn Gel; Alocane Maximum Strength Emergency Burn Gel, 2.5 Fl Oz; Adult Oral IV, -Liquid I.V.TM Hydration Multiplier; DripDrop ORS Electrolyte Hydration Powder Sticks, Berry Flavor 2-Pack, Makes (8) 16oz Servings.

Dental materials:

Fluoride treatments: Fluoride treatments may be liquid, gel, foam or varnish that's brushed onto teeth; Filing materials_reinforced zinc oxide- eugenol composition; Tempit Moisture-Activated Temporary Filling and Sealing

Material, 30 - .35 Gm; Oral hygiene bags containing (toothbrush, Toothpaste and Waxed Floss); Mouthwash.











ABOUT THE MATTHEW 25 MARK

The circular shape represents unity and equality. Like God, a circle has no beginning and no end, and it symbolizes our continuing effort to help one another. The shape also suggests a globe that points to our engagement with the world.

The three interlocking figures represent the equality of all people without gender or race bias. They have their arms around each other, symbolizing friendship, protection and service. The number three suggests the three focus areas of congregational vitality, structural racism and systematic poverty, as well as the Trinity.

The color palette is bright, lively, friendly and energetic — suggestive of our active commitment.

Finally, the legend "Matthew 25" below the symbol is the literal identification of the mark. We use a handwritten font to make the point that active engagement in the world requires human effort.
