STATED MEETINGS

There are other volunteers who bring prepared food and goodies on a regular basis. We are appreciative of the faithful contribution of members Alma and Abel McBride who bring meal items every third Sunday of each month. Mr. Gilbert Miranda's generosity provides the paper goods, which is a significant financial contribution that aids our budget.

KP HELP IS NEEDED

The major ongoing need is helping with clean up after fellowship. Often, after all is done, the Chair is left alone in the kitchen to clean up and wash dishes. It would also be beneficial to have prior knowledge as to what food members will be bringing for us to plan and supplement the offerings. We have made several efforts to improve this by posting sign-up sheets on the bulletin board, publishing a hospitality notice in the church newsletter and by making a plea for volunteers in our minute for mission from the pulpit. All of this has produced minimal results and continues to be an issue.

BUDGET

The hospitality budget for 2019 was \$1,000. We have requested an increase for the 2020 budget to a new total of \$2,000.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

In 2019, 52 email announcements were sent to 170 members of the Announcements email group.

CHURCH MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Breeze, a CHurch Management System (CHMS), was installed in November, 2017, and populated with known demographic and church register information for all members and friends. 2019 is the second year that Breeze is being used by our offering counters for contributions, and they report it's a breeze to use! Contributions are exported from Breeze to QuickBooks for financial accounting and the production of reports. The Clerk of Session uses Breeze to automate (not replace) the written/printed church registries, and to produce reports when requested by higher councils, e.g. end of year statistical reports required by GA.

DIRECTORY

We have a few copies of the bound pictorial directory produced in 2018. Our practice is to produce a hard-bound pictorial directory every four years, scheduled again for 2022. We continued support and updates to Instant Church Directory (ICD), which includes an app for hand-held devices, which 59 members and friends have installed. This data in the ICD application is updated whenever contact information changes. Anyone can install the application, but your email address must be -in- the ICD data for authorization to download pictures and contact information for members and friends of Second.

FACEBOOK

51 posts in 2019, some by the Pastor! We have 136 followers.

NEWSLETTER

We have been blessed and fortunate with eager contributors of content, and to have stellar crews that assisted with assembling, folding, and taping the printed version. Distribution is to 192 addresses via USPS bulk mail, and to 80 email addresses via a PDF file. We solicit suggestions for improvement and encourage all with email addresses to switch to the PDF version (it's in color!).

WEBSITE

We regularly update the home page. We post videos of regular worship services, and occasionally post videos of the Wednesday Bible Study, depending on subject matter.

BUDGET

\$1,645 of the \$1,669 budget was expended: 12%-website; 33%-newsletter postage; 10%-newsletter paper/copying; 9%-miscellaneous; 36% for the Breeze CHMS.

12 - MISSION

COMMITTEE MEMBERS

EMPHASIS

Second has a strong mission emphasis. We are committed to local, national, and international mission endeavors. The Committee continues to share mission and ministry with Camino de Vida Presbyterian Church, First Presbyterian Church, and Shepherd of the Valley Presbyterian church. Further, the Committee provides financial assistance to Menaul High School and the Menaul School Historical Library, Camino de Vida, and Young Adult Volunteers.

YOUNG ADULT VOLUNTEER

This past year, we were fortunate to have been awarded a Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) through the Presbyterian Church (USA). Lauren LaMonica participated in all committees and various other activities. Lauren was housed at Menaul School and volunteered at Second until July 2019. Lauren joined the church as an Affiliate Member this past year and continues to assist with Sunday School.

PROJECT SHARE

The committee, on behalf of the church, works with and supports Project Share (feeding the homeless at St. Martin's with casseroles). Volunteers continue to support Project Share every other month by preparing casseroles for the homeless and low income. These are delivered to St. Martin's Hospitality Center.

WINGS FOR LIFE

The WINGS ministry program supports families of prisoners. WINGS is housed at our church two Monday evenings per month. Second continues to support the Program by allowing the group to use our facility twice a month in the evenings. Families are provided with a meal and inspirational activities. Elders from our church volunteer to open and close the building from 4:30pm to 8:00pm on the second and last Monday evenings of each month.

FAMILY PROMISE

This program continues to be housed in the Candelaria Wing, providing services to homeless families. A concert by Karmen Van Dyke, Donna McRae, and Debi Eisenhouer was held to raise funds to support Family Promise. Over \$2,500 was raised.

CUBA

The Presbytery of Santa Fe planned a mission trip to Cuba in October. Second sent donations with Susan Smith to our partner church, Iglesia Presbyteriana de Matanzas Central in Matanzas, Cuba. The mission committee sent \$300 and the Men's group sent \$200.

NM CONFERENCE OF CHURCHES

The Committee supported the New Mexico Conferences of Churches CIRCO fundraising event by purchasing a table for eight for \$250. The event benefits:

- New Mexico Conference of Churches
- Detention Ministry
- Archdiocese of Santa Fe Family Services
- New Mexico Pilgrimage for Unity
- Refugee and Asylee Program
- Lutheran Family Services

TRANSASYLEE PROJECT

Second has partnered with the New Mexico Faith Coalition for Immigrant Justice and the TransLatin@ Coalition to provide temporary housing to transgender asylees in the upstairs apartment of the Candelaria Wing. The apartment manager has been hosting asylees by providing meals and maintaining the apartment. During the past year, we have provided housing to over 70 asylees. Members of the Mission Committee and other church members have reached out to provide assistance to meet the needs of this project, such as food, clothing, cleaning products, furniture, towels and bedding.

CHILE FEST

Second participated in the annual Chile Fest hosted by Shepherd of the Valley Presbyterian Church. The Committee hosted a table with the "Alternative Gift" project to seek donations to our Transgender Asylee project. People were curious and interested about this project and donated generously. Mission Committee members also assisted at the Book Sale.

IMMIGRANT ASSISTANCE

During the spring and summer months, with Kay Huggins' leadership, we provided meals to immigrant refugees in Albuquerque, most of them arriving via buses from El Paso.

CRISTO REY CLINIC

The Committee agreed to support the Cristo Rey Medical and Dental Clinic in Juarez. This clinic has treated more than 3,500 medical patients and 2,800 dental patients living in makeshift shelters surrounding the city. The clinic continues to treat patients who have been deported from the United States and have no means with which to cover their medical expenses. The committee sent \$350 to Cristo Rey Lutheran Church in El Paso, Texas, to provide services to this clinic.

OTHER PROGRAMS

The Committee sent \$100 to the NM Faith Coalition for Immigrant Justice as a donation for their fund-raising luncheon. We donated \$175 to Dori Hjalmarson, a PCUSA missionary in Honduras. Along with Camino de Vida and First Presbyterian, we collected sleeping bags, jackets and blankets for asylum seekers in Ciudad Juarez through November 3, and delivered the items on November 15. We support NM Voices for Children. Pastor Rob is on their board. Over 1,440 pounds of food were delivered to the Storehouse and Roadrunner Food Bank during this past year. This food is collected on the first Sunday of each month during church service.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS

BACKGROUND

Due to our present times and realities of active shooters in public places including churches and places of worship, members of our congregation expressed concern about their safety while attending worship. This concern was expressed on numerous occasions and the question was raised "what is Session doing to address this concern"? Thus, an initial meeting on safety was convened on August of this year. We reached out to other churches to research what steps they had taken to address safety. First Presbyterian shared valuable information and resource materials with us including their safety manual.

MISSION STATEMENT

To maintain an open, welcoming worship experience while enhancing our awareness of church safety and security to enrich our community of observant Christians. Our goal is to be proactive rather than reactive, with a better be safe than sorry philosophy. We have attempted to instill an increased awareness of our surroundings and being active participants in our church safety.

SAFETY CONCERNS

There have been several vandalism incidents of concern that have occurred on our property during the past several months. Including:

- Three of our beautiful stained-glass windows have been broken
- Persons have climbed over the fence and have been camping on church property
- Some have attempted to start fires
- Increase in persons hanging outside church after hours and leaving trash on grounds

PROACTIVE ACTIONS TAKEN

- Locking the door to Fellowship Hall during worship and Choir practice sessions
- Sign on Fellowship Hall door directing late comers to join us in worship through front door of sanctuary
- Initiated an observant usher role at worship (more volunteers need)
- Walk through exterior perimeter and identified better lighting and camera needs
- Two members have attended active shooter training sponsored by First Presbyterian
- Security meeting held with interested congregation members to discuss recent vandalism and focus on preventive solutions
- 2020 budget has included funding for security committee to provide for security needs

CONCLUSION

Being safe and feeling safe is a status we all value and for the most part, take for granted. However, with the reality of current trends and events in society today, we are alerted to be more aware of our surroundings in our environment every day. Your Security Ministry committee, along with all members of the congregation, are committed to ensuring a safe environment for worship. Keeping in mind that to do so is everyone's responsibility.

BUDGET CHALLENGES

At the Session retreat in Ghost Ranch, the session reviewed the budget and determined we were projected to have a significant short fall. We scrutinized the budget by line item and made cuts where we could without impacting what we believed to be important missions of our church. We agreed that we should approach our congregation and be transparent about our budget deficit, asking for a re-pledge from those who were able. At our February congregation meeting I informed the congregation of our deficit and assured them we would continue to be transparent with them as we moved forward in addressing this issue. I met with the women's and men's groups and asked for their input and suggestions in resolving the deficit. Throughout the year we have given updates as to our progress and status to the congregation. Our congregation responded amazingly. We had 32 increases in pledges which made a significant impact on reducing our deficit. I am pleased to announce that through YOUR efforts we were able to close that gap and finished the year in the black. THANK YOU ALL.

TRANSITIONAL CHANGES

At the Session retreat I was selected to Chair this committee for 2019. This committee has undergone some major transition changes in 2019. Ruth Montoya and John Van Dyke have both fulfilled their responsibilities as Session Elders after serving two plus terms. They have left huge roles to fill and vacancies in both the Chair

and Co-Chair of the committee. John Van Dyke after over 12 years diligently and professionally serving as our bookkeeper had decided to step down from this role. However, Ruth has stayed as an active and valued member of this committee and has been instrumental in providing continuity with the transition. Mr. Chadwick Poole, a longtime friend of Second church, with the assistance and cooperation of John Van Dyke, has graciously agreed to help us transition our bookkeeping to an electronic system called Quick Books. This system is compatible with the contributions module of our Church Management System, Breeze. Mr. Poole has done all this work without compensation. He has agreed to continue to assist us in this role. Session has agreed to compensate him at a rate \$250.00 per month effective October 2019. We are pleased to announce that this transition has been completed and all. bookkeeping records are in electronic systems of Quick Books and Breeze.

PAYING TREASURER

This responsibility is being managed very effectively by Lynn Gatewood. She has taken on this role very seriously and professionally. On several occasions she has come to Session meetings to discuss areas of concerns she has uncovered in our billings. She has been instrumental in assisting Mr. Poole with the transition, getting bank statements and other documentation. She sorts out all vouchers and pays our bills in a timely manner.

COUNTING COORDINATOR

Ruth Montoya coordinates these duties quite effectively. She recruits, trains, and schedules weekly counters, and makes the bank deposits. Currently we have five dedicated counters on a rotation basis.

STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN

Our campaign theme for this year is "20/20 Vision", as we enter a new decade. The campaign has been well received and Pastor Rob has done an excellent job promoting this theme from the pulpit and through our children's sermons. The testimonials presented in Minute for Mission were outstanding. Pastor Rob, in consultation with the committee, developed the congregational letter that was mailed out, along with pledge cards, to our membership prior to dedication Sunday. The entire campaign has been well received as evidenced by the 44 pledge cards brought forward on dedication Sunday, with more continuing to trickle in on Sunday offering.

SPECIAL OFFERINGS

We have participated in all four special offerings throughout the year; One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Peace and Global Witness, and Christmas Joy were all received during their designated season.

COMMITTEE BUDGET

We stayed within our committee budget of \$1,500. The funds were spent on mail outs to the congregation, printing of pledge cards, brochures, offering envelopes and special offering materials, for postage for three congregational mailouts, and for recognition celebration costs.

17 - WORSHIP AND MUSIC

As I complete my term as Ruling Elder and Chair of the Worship and Music Committee, I am grateful for the honor of serving the fellowship of Second. My term in office has been a grand learning experience about the Presbyterian Church, Second, and many members of our congregation. I have been deeply moved by the consistent and inspired quality of worship that has been maintained and enhanced during 2019. The committee

is blessed with wisdom, experience and creativity in developing worship experiences. In addition to an excellent committee, many volunteers have played important supporting roles, and you will see many of their names scattered through this report. It has been a blessing to serve this faith community so grounded in joy and inclusiveness.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS

This year the committee was made up of the following individuals: Anita Abeyta (Christian Education Liaison), Nancy Montoya, Mickey McHugh, Loraine Romero (Board of Deacons Liaison), Beverly Chavez, Karmen Van Dyke, Pastor Rob Woodruff, Chair Don Bixby, with notable support from Susie Chang, Ruth Montoya and Marie Kenny. The experience and expertise of our Parish Associate, Rev. Dr. Kay Huggins provided creativity and wisdom as we developed liturgical themes.

RESPONSIBILITIES

- Monthly planning meetings: Each Sunday's worship service is the result of planning by committee members and others with creative ideas and support. The special celebrations of the church year such as Lent and Advent, require additional time, attention to detail and energy provided by committee members and others of the fellowship.
- Sound system: Thanks to John Van Dyke for faithfully staffing the sound system for many years. That task has now been assumed by Trancito Romero, Reme Molo, Imelda Atencio and Tom Mirabal. The sanctuary audio system has also been upgraded under the direction of Karmen Van Dyke, with advance capabilities and a new pulpit microphone.
- <u>Ushers</u>: These folks are the first Sunday morning contact to visitors, friends and members of Second.
 Thanks to all of you who usher us into worship. Louella Gurulé has continued to solicit the assistance of ushers for our weekly services. In addition to her direct requests, volunteers are encouraged to use the sign-up sheet. The committee also amended and updated the Usher Policy to give more consistency to this important welcoming aspect of worship.
- Sanctuary Preparation: While the ritual of words and music are central to worship, the other senses also play a part. The liturgical colors of banners and paraments signify the changing season of the church year. Candles, folk art, flowers, an array of musical instruments, and Christian symbols enrich our worship experience. Many of these objects are part of Second's collection, while others are graciously loaned by members of the congregation. Ruth Montoya, Anita Torres, and the Deacons help to bring order to the Sanctuary after each service, while Bob Romero keeps the candles supplied with oil. Nancy Montoya fills the baptismal font each week and Toby Montoya empties the font at the end of each service. Bev Molo has recently come on board to help coordinate weddings and funerals.
- <u>Lay Leaders</u>: Karmen Van Dyke identifies lay leaders for each Sunday. We are grateful for the many voices heard from the pulpit who participate in bringing the Word to congregation.
- <u>Children's Moment Providers</u>: Becky Johnson organizes the team that brings a message to our children and youth, each Sunday. We appreciate your gifts as teachers: Marie Kenny, Becky Johnson, Abel McBride, Lynn Gatewood, Randall Korver-Glenn, and Pastor Rob. If you're willing to help with the Children's message, we would welcome you.
- Youth/Children's Participation: This committee has established a priority to include our youth and children in our worship services. We welcome and encourage the gifts they bring as they serve as lay leaders, processing communion elements, singing, playing musical instruments, ushering, offering minutes for mission and more. Several youths made pledges of these services to the church during our stewardship campaign this year. The emphasis on our young people is shared by our youth leaders, Sunday school teachers, Christian Education Committee, music program leaders and teachers, and Pastor Rob. We are grateful to all these mentors on behalf of the children and youth of this church.
- Communion Schedule & Committee Budget: These two important items are developed and submitted annually by this committee to Session.

- Holy Communion: The Deacons direct the monthly first Sunday and special communion services. In addition, the Deacons bring communion and fellowship to our home-bound members.
- Pulpit Supply: Pastor Rob along with the committee identify appropriate individuals to fill the pulpit in his absence. We are especially grateful to have the leadership of Rev. Kay for many of these times when Pastor Rob is away.
- Weekly recording of Sermon & Services: Thank you Livewire Committee for carrying out this task and uploading these recordings to our website.
- Music & Choirs: Karmen Van Dyke, Debi Eisenhour and Beverly Chavez provide us with inspiring music each Sunday. Our own adult and youth choirs as well as guest vocalists and musicians are included in the planning and selection of music for worship (You'll see more about this in Karmen's report.).
- Floral Gifts: The sign-up sheet is posted in Fellowship Hall. Our worship services have been enhanced by your willingness to provide flowers for nearly every Sunday of 2019. Please continue to sign up and celebrate days and people who are special in your life.
- Voices from the Pew: On the last Sunday of each summer month in 2018, we were inspired by messages from members of our congregation. We continued this type of service on the fifth Sundays throughout 2019. These speakers included life stories from Jack Torres, Lena De Herrera, Elizabeth Korver-Glenn, Lauren LaMonica, Abel McBride, Ruth Montoya, and Kay Huggins. We received the gifts of these stories with gratitude. These more casual worship services were held in Fellowship Hall and had the flavor of a hymn sing, with both selected and requested hymns.

WORSHIP HIGHLIGHTS

- Ash Wednesday (evening service): Our journey into Lent began with combined choirs of First and Second Churches. The ashes used for imposition by Revs. Rob Woodruff, Matt Miller, Stephanie Kremmel and Nancy Benson-Nicol, were prepared from the palms of the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration. The service concluded with a firepit outside the church. Thanks to the many participants who made this service meaningful.
- Maundy Thursday: The service was co-officiated by Pastor Rob and Rev. Kelly Gregory. We celebrated with a Passover setting made more intimate by our new round tables. A simple soup supper with authentic Middle Eastern flat breads, was enhanced with the use of Ruth Montoya's blue goblets, white table cloths and blue and white candles. The foot and hand washing ritual was led by of our Deacons and Elders.
- Palm Sunday: Palm Sunday worship featured a drama depicting Christ's entry into Jerusalem. Thanks to Marie Kenny for coordinating this moving presentation, and to all those who took roles in the drama. Yvonne Gallegos, once again, donated the palms in memory of her husband, Marty.
- Good Friday Tenebrae Service: As we gathered in silence, the cross was processed by Bob and Trancito Romero. The service and story unfolded through moving music and narration presented by the combined choirs of Risen Savior Roman Catholic Church and Second. When the Sanctuary had been stripped, the last candle had been extinguished and the entrance to the tomb had been closed, we exited in silence. This is a particularly moving service.
- Easter Sunday: Sunrise service was led by Pastor Rob in the Peace Garden decorated with butterflies, a symbol of resurrection, and it was followed by a tasty pot-luck brunch. At the regular worship we were greeted outside the church by the rousing Mariachi band and a cross in which worshipers inserted hundreds of U.S. grown blossoms. Dozens of Easter lilies decorated the Sanctuary. Wreaths of flowers and butterflies hung from the ceiling and other areas of the Sanctuary. New banners designed and donated by Sharon Oler were received and displayed with gratitude.
- Pentecost Sunday: The Spirit of Pentecost was symbolized in the Sanctuary with red banners, red floral arrangements and an array of red candles on the Communion table. By invitation, many worshipers also arrived dressed in red.
- World Communion Sunday: While this service proclaimed and celebrated the global aspect of Christian Fellowship, our focus this year was on Central America. This was especially appropriate because of the

connection our church has with Guatemala, because of the continuing political challenges in Central America, and because our church and community have been working with issues of asylum seekers and refugees in our own community. Rev. Dori Hjalmarson, Missionary to Honduras gave the message. Textiles from Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras and Mexico energized the sanctuary loaned by Martha Powers, Karla Woodruff, Alma McBride, and the gift of Dori Hjalmarson. Holy Communion table featured corn tortillas.

- Reformation Sunday: Historically appropriate music, a procession by the youth of the Communion elements and Bible, and the Solas representing *Scripture*, *Faith*, and *Grace* recalled the precepts and traditions of the early Reformation.
- All Saints Celebration: Friends and members were invited to bring images of departed loved ones. These were displayed in the Sanctuary on tables brightened with candles and small floral arrangements. A video of members who had passed during the year was projected on the wall of the Sanctuary. Thanks to George Huggins and Kris Johnson for their technical expertise.
- Advent Season: The Advent Wreath and candles, purple banners and paraments, evergreens and purple
 ribbons set the tone for the season of waiting. The Advent theme was messages from the prophet Isaiah.
 Rev. Kay Huggins developed the liturgy for each Sunday and used props for the scriptures in each of the
 weekly Children's Moments.
 - o On the first Sunday of Advent, the purple candle of Hope was lighted by the Atencio-Wilson family and the Children's Moment was a sculpture depicting the transformation of sword into plowshare.
 - On the second Sunday a purple candle of Peace was lighted by the Korver-Glenn family. The Children's Moment focused on the shoot from Jesse's stump.
 - On the third Sunday the pink candle of Joy was added, and lighted by the Bixby's and Caroline Zeek.
 The Children's Moment featured a Christmas cactus as a symbol of the desert blooming, in addition to 30 dazzling poinsettias in the sanctuary.
 - o The fourth Sunday the purple candle of Love was added and lighted by the Austin family. The Children's Moment included a banner proclaiming *Emmanuel God with Us*.
 - O The Christ Candle joined all the others candles on Christmas Eve lighted by the extended family of Susie and Francis Chang. The service included Holy Communion, and ended in the darkened sanctuary by passing the light from the Christ candle to all members of the congregation while singing *Silent Night*. The traditional firepit was foregone because of rain.

After services on December 15, teams of carolers had a soup lunch and visited our home bound members along with maps and routes organized by Deacon Chair Loraine Romero. This meaningful tradition is always welcomed by those who receive the visits as well as those who make the visits.

December 29 was a fifth Sunday when our worship service was held in Fellowship Hall. Rev. Jamie Martinez acted with warmth as coordinator as we sang preselected and requested hymns and carols. Voices from the Pew recalled Christmas memories from Southern Colorado by Ruth Montoya, and Northern New Mexico by Able McBride.

Additional Celebrations to Note: These are some of the other special celebrations that came into our Sunday worship services and will likely be mentioned in other Committee reports.

- This year we incorporated a healing ritual into services in April and November. Individuals received blessings/prayers as aromatic oils were used to anoint the participants. This has been a deeply meaningful ritual by the congregation and visitors.
- Recognized our Nonagenarians.
- The Gifts of Women is a service planned and lead entirely by the women of our church
- Celebrating our graduates
- Commissioned our Sunday School teachers

• Celebrated our members of 50+ years

Reclaimed Space: The reclamation of the basement is now functional for storage of seasonal worship properties and costumes. As good stewards the redistribution of a great deal of surplus materials to other churches, groups and agencies continues and has been inspiring. This this new storage space has reduced the pile-up in the sound room and provided better access and function to that space. As a result, the sound room has also been cleaned, painted and organized. Both projects were made possible by volunteer labor and generous monetary gifts from Anita Chavez and Marty Martinez.

18 - MUSIC MINISTRY

ADULT CHOIR

The 2019 Adult Choir has once again struggled with health and family complications which have impacted on numbers—but, generally, not diminished the quality of their leadership. While we long for more men, our college age men, Cisco Chavez, Diego Chavez, Gabriel Van Dyke and Javier McBride, have responded when they are available.

Our biggest time and talent commitment this year, was the November 17, Christ the King Concert with Risen Savior Roman Catholic Community and Rio Rancho Presbyterian Church. The concert was created in response to ecumenical relationships these choir directors share, and to give the three choirs opportunity to sing "bigger" and more demanding choral music, as well as "favorites" from each choir. The concert allowed each of the directors, Nancy Leffler, Richard Macklin, and Karmen Van Dyke, to conduct, and a small orchestra accompanied two of the classical compositions. Risen Savior also provided a "jazz" ensemble for two of the anthems.

Summer choral leadership was handled by soloists and ensembles, including Ruth Silva, and Bianca and Mariano Morales, Bev Chavez, Debi Eisenhour, Marie Kenny, Ruth Montoya, Gloria Mirabal, Nancy Montoya, George Huggins and EPIC Ensemble.

SHARING WORSHIP AND MUSIC WITH OTHER CONGREGATIONS

In January, Second once again led the service of Prayer for Christian Unity. Taizé chants, accompanied by Kay Huggins, flute, Isaac Ploof, clarinet, George Huggins, guitar, and Karmen Van Dyke, keyboard, began at Second, while a cross-led procession traveled from San Ignacio to Second. A choral ensemble, Bev Chavez, George Huggins, Ruth Montoya, and Annika Reid, led congregational music, accompanied by Bob Deuble on congas, and Camila Hoover cantored the Psalm.

Ash Wednesday was our fourth opportunity to sing and pray this service with First Presbyterian. The combined choirs led responses and provided an anthem, and cantors included Rob Woodruff and Camila Hoover. Instrumentalists accompanying the Taizé chants were Kay Huggins, flute, Grace Meindl, oboe, Roland DeRose, clarinet, Ryan Chavez, cello, and Karmen Van Dyke keyboard.

Good Friday was the sixth year to present St. John's Passion with Risen Savior Roman Catholic Community. Second's soloists this year were Allan Holmquist and Annika Reid. Attendance was the largest we have hosted, with many from other than Risen Savior or Second.

In May, our choir (with invitations extended to others) provided an anthem and leadership for Menaul Schools' Baccalaureate, hosted by Immanuel Presbyterian.

August found our youth leading the entire Sunday morning worship service at Emmanuel Presbyterian, Peñasco. Much music was included, especially songs learned at Triennium. Both Karmen and Debi were on site to assist in what proved to be a significant worship service. The youth were then asked to present the same worship setting for Second.

YOUTH AND CHILDREN

Debi Eisenhouer's leadership has grown the Children's Choir in numbers and skills. The children have experienced use of instruments to accompany two-part anthems, singing with the adult choir, and several solo opportunities as part of anthems. Under Debi's direction is a new effort to prepare worship music with high schoolers, currently called EPIC ENSEMBLE. We're hoping to see more of them in 2020.

INSTRUMENTALISTS

Instrumental musicians continue to enhance and energize many of our worship settings. This year musicians included: Susan Brake, bassoon; Joy Bohning, flute; Amanda Candelaria, rain stick; Ryan Chavez, cello; Steve Chavez, marimba; Tilda Chavez, percussion; Kristin Cochrane, oboe; Hovey Corbin, marimba; Bob Deuble, guitar; Roland de Rose, clarinet and percussion; George Huggins, guitar; Kay Huggins, flute; Michael Lee, congas; Grace Meindl, oboe; Isaac Ploof, clarinet; Corine Ragsdale, French horn; Jori Smith, clarinet; and Annika Reid, percussion. Mariachi Sonido Nuevo again led our Easter 10:30am fiesta.

TO THE CONGREGATION: YOUR THOUGHTS

This year's worship planning included more silence and more chanting. Chanting was the preparation for each Sunday worship in Lent and Advent, and in several other special services. Responses from you indicate appreciation for these experiences. You are encouraged to provide feedback on those things that enhance your worship.

More music is being printed in the bulletin to encourage congregational participation. While the chancel choir is willing and able to sing all responses, in our slice of Protestantism, the congregation is the "real" choir, and we hope you will find it possible (and pleasurable) to participate in these responses.
