### "Thoughts for the New Year"

Hermanos y Hermanas en Cristo,

As we say goodbye to 2019 and welcome 2020, many of us are considering resolutions. It is the time of year in which we can naturally begin something new. We are wise to contemplate changes and improvements for our lives in the form of resolutions. Last week at the gym, someone commented about how the membership will spike in January. Every year the number of people showing up to work out increases in January and February. But it was also mentioned that, by March, gym participation will recede to normal levels. The indication, of course, is that many who believe the new year is a good time to start an exercise routine wane in their enthusiasm within a couple of months. What makes a New Year's resolution successful depends upon myriad of factors. However, one important element of sticking with a resolution is making space for something new.

Many resolutions wither after we embrace the idea of doing something new, but do not prepare ourselves spiritually, psychologically, or practically to sustain that idea. If our lives are already filled, how can we fit anything else into them? Kenosis ( $\kappa \acute{v}\omega\sigma$ ic) is the Greek word from the New Testament that describes Jesus emptying himself to be filled with God's will. Such a notion may be helpful for both new resolutions as well as our spiritual journeys. A sustained resolution and a sustained faith journey require continually making space for the new.

In the words of the late author Joseph Campbell, "We must be willing to let go of the life we have planned, so as to accept the life that is waiting for us." As we begin the new year, let us be honest with ourselves about what we need to let go of—what we need to empty ourselves of—to live into new and faithful practices. We may need to let go of emotions, ideas, or habits that hold us back from what God calls us to be and do.



### WORSHIP AND MUSIC

#### The Christian Liturgical Year

Advent marks the beginning of the Christian Liturgical year, but Epiphany is the first Sunday of our secular year. In Western Christianity, the feast commemorates principally (but not solely) the visit of the Magi to the Christ Child. It is sometimes called Three Kings' Day. The traditional date for the feast is January 6, or the Twelve day after Christmas. Since 1970, the celebration is held on the Sunday after January 1. Popular Epiphany customs include Epiphany singing, chalking the door, having one's house blessed, consuming Three Kings Cake, winter swimming, as well as attending church services. In the Hispanic culture Epiphany is a significant holy day and our worship service this year will reflect a very Spanish flavor.

The liturgical color for Epiphany is white but changes to green the following day. On Sunday, January 12, we celebrate the Lord's baptism, and the color for that day is white, again, immediately changing back to green until the beginning of Lent, when the color is purple.

#### Sounds of the Season

The Worship Committee, with initiation by Karmen Van Dyke, has contracted with Pace Electronics to upgrade our sanctuary sound system. We now have a new pulpit microphone, an additional channel on our sound board for another microphone, and other adjustments. We will all appreciate these improvements in our audio experience in worship.

#### SUNDAY MORNING ADULT EDUCATION by Rev. Kay Huggins, Parish Associate

Welcome to the winter quarter of The Present Word, a study of personal and corporate expressions of worship. We begin our study with King David, known as "a man after God's own heart." David is a strong example of a spiritual leader who worships God in his own life but who also takes bold measures to ensure Israel's right worship as prescribed in God's holy covenant. On December 22, the fourth Sunday of Advent, we look at worship through the eyes of Mary's Song in Luke 1. Her worshipful song of thanksgiving and praise is reminiscent of many of the Hebrew psalms attributed to David.

In January 2020, we explore worship through the building of the Temple in Jerusalem. While David put all

the plans in place for constructing a house for God, it was his son Solomon whom God ordained to complete the work. In February, we join the disciples to sit at the feet of Jesus and learn from his teaching on honoring God through our worship.

The class shares leadership for each Sunday; the discussions are lively; and everyone receives a blessing through participating. Whether young or old, well studied or new to scripture, this class is a unique opportunity to explore scripture in community. Study guides are provided (large print!) and the class size expands from 7 to 15 depending on your participation!

### PUERTO RICO UPDATE

Hello Lynn:

I am writing to you, first to thank you and Ruth Silva, as well as the whole community of the Second Presbyterian Church of Albuquerque for the support you had provided to the diverse efforts I have been coordinating together with local community leadership after hurricane María severely damaged several of the most vulnerable and most rural communities in Puerto Rico.

I have received the check you sent of \$1,073.00 which I deposited last week in the Oriental Bank account of Instituto de Ciencias para la Conservación de Puerto Rico. For your information, I am including the deposit record here as an attachment.

We are still actively supporting the four community kitchens that provided food for residents in their immediate community who are living under insecure food conditions due to their weakness and vulnerable health, phyco-social instability, lack of family support, or very poor economic status. We also continue our efforts to find additional resources needed for the local fishing village in Playa Guayanés, Yabucoa, that still need to replace two freezers to keep their catch, two boat trailers to move their small boats in and out of the water, two outboard motors and help for one of the fisherman family to replace their FEMA blue tarp with a secured roof.

In the mountains of Cayey we also are supporting a community aqueduct that serves about 20 families of the rural community of Tinito Marín, in the town of Cayey. Here we have installed a chlorinating system to clean the water as it enters the reservoir tank of the aqueduct, a very important measure since the fresh water comes directly from a wild creek higher in mountains. The system was successfully installed and has been use for more than a year. However, the system works with cloro tablets that needs to be bought every year, and they are approaching the time where they may need to buy more to maintain the water quality they need. The families of this community are very active in managing and maintaining their aqueduct. However, the cost of tools, materials, and cloro supplies is a burden for them, so we help them as we can with these while they supply all the necessary labor work which does not represent a monetary expense.

For your information and reference, I am including some pictures of the fishing village in Yabucoa and of the aqueduct of Tinito Marin community because these are the two project areas where we expect to spend the funds you have sent this time. There is still a lot more to do, and all the support we can get is welcome. If you would like to know more about it, and more detailed information about our efforts to promote and build community capacity and resilience I will be happy to provide it.

Thanks again. I hope one day I have the chance to meet you and thank you personally for all your help as well as of the brothers and sisters of Second Presbyterian Church of Albuquerque.

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MR. MELECIO TRUJILLO, OUR EIGHTH PASTOR, SERVING 1916-17 From "A History of Second Presbyterian Church, 1889-2015", Gil Solis, ed.; pages 24-26

"A man of sterling, noble character and deep spiritual faith, no better person could have been selected to meet the challenges that this community and environs offered. A community which he served with dignity and pride, in all levels of existence during a great portion of his life."

These words, taken from an award presented to him by the YMCA, embody the essential characteristics of the life of our next Pastor, Mr. Melecio Trujillo. He was a man of exceptional Christian integrity and deeply dedicated to serve his Lord in whatever capacity and in whatever situation.

Mr. Melecio Trujillo was born in Rio Chiquito, near Taos, New Mexico on December 5,1886. At the age of 6, he was enrolled in the Presbyterian Mission School in Ranchos de Taos. He attended school for three months each year. In 1898, he entered the Presbyterian Mission School in Chimayo,

New Mexico. He attended this school until 1907. He then enrolled as a student at Menaul School in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

While at Menaul School, he became a Presbyterian and from that day forward, Mr. Trujillo radiated the Christian life to the fullest. In 1911, he was one of six students in that year's graduating class. He was subsequently hired by Menaul School to take charge of the School's farm. He remained in that position for the next five years. It was at the end of this period that Mr. Trujillo consented to serve as a lay evangelist for the Presbyterian Church. He was assigned to take charge of the Spanish Church in Los Martinez and the Spanish Presbyterian Church in Placitas, New Mexico.

In 1917, he enrolled in the agricultural college at Las Cruces, New Mexico. During the summers he served as the assistant to the Bernalillo County Agricultural Agent. In 1920-21, he organized 4-H Clubs for boys and girls. He spent the year 1922 at home in Chimayo, New Mexico taking care of the family farm. In the spring of 1923, Mr. Trujillo was recommended by the State College in Las Cruces for a job with the YMCA in Miami, Arizona. Miami was the site of a copper mine. This mine employed many Mexican laborers. As with today's immigrant laborers, these Mexican nationals, having left their families behind in search of better wages, sent most of their earnings back home to their families.

Consequently, there was very little to do during their hours away from work. The YMCA recognized this opportunity to help these men, so Mr. Trujillo was hired to spearhead the YMCA's efforts.

He saw this as an opportunity to counsel and guide these men in living a wholesome, Christian life. While in Miami, Mr. Trujillo became an Elder in the Miami Presbyterian Church under the pastorate of Rev. Moreno. He remained in Miami until 1926, when he was offered a more lucrative and responsible position with the YMCA. He was to be the Regional Executive Secretary in El Paso, Texas. While in this capacity he continued working with the Mexican people. He surrendered the work in Miami to another Menaul graduate, Mr. Alfonso Esquibel, who later became a Presbyterian minister.

Rev. Alfonso Esquibel and his wife Ada were instrumental in spreading the gospel in Las Vegas, NM. Their son, Alfonso Esquibel, Jr. and grand daughter, Lisa Esquibel attended Second Presbyterian Church in Albuquerque.

While in EI Paso, Mr. Trujillo joined the Spanish Presbyterian Church there and served as an Elder. During his lifetime, he served as an elder for a total of seventy years. He also served as a commissioner to the General

Assembly on three separate occasions. The first time in Miami, Arizona, and twice in El Paso, Texas. He also attained the rank of 32nd degree mason in the Masonic Order.

The award quoted at the beginning, continues with these words ....

"The value of the little things and personal favors amounted To 'great, noble' little things to all the people he served, Always finding something he could do and so endearing Himself to all the children, youth and adults. He gave to the word 'Compatriota' a greater, deeper Meaning of friendship and love which will be in our Minds and hearts forever,"

Although he was showered with praise and awards for his work everywhere, it never changed his down-toearth, friendly and humble character. A devout Christian and staunch Presbyterian, the ranks of the ordained clergy missed out on one who could have become an outstanding ordained clergyman.

Mr. Melecio Trujillo passed on to his eternal reward the 7th of February, 1983, in a hospital in Española, New Mexico.


