"Grad" & "Gress"

Hermanos y Hermanas en Cristo,

There is a Latin root that makes its way into several English words. It is a root that seems especially applicable at the moment. There are two ways the root appears in English. One is "grad," and the other is "gress." What are some words you know that contain the root? For grad, some include: **grad**ual, up**grad**e, **grad**ient, de**grad**e, centi**grad**e, and retro**grad**e. For gress, words include: trans**gress**, re**gress**, pro**gress**, con**gress**, ag**gress**ive, and e**gress**. With at least some of those words, it may make sense to you that the root means "step." **Grad**ual means proceeding slowly, step-by-step. Up**grad**e means to improve by stepping up. Or, trans**gress**, which means stepping beyond a boundary. Re**gress** is to step back. And pro**gress**, means to step forward.

So why the Latin root lesson? Two reasons. This month we will celebrate the **grad**uations of several in our church. Presbyterianism elevates the importance of developing both head and heart. The EPIC article in this newsletter will let you know who is graduating, and from where, as they have worked hard to train their minds for the future. Please take some time to call or write our graduates to celebrate their big step forward and to help them celebrate their progress!

The other reason for the lesson is to recognize how coming back together as a worship community and as a society will be a **grad**ual process. In his letter to the Ephesians (4:2), Paul encourages, "Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love." With time, we will find an e**gress** from our current situation that leads us back together without the re**gress**ion that would come from impatience. A common expression in Spanish is "poco a poco" or "paso a paso." Their meanings respectively are "little-by-little," and "step-by-step."

As we celebrate scholarly milestones and as we prayerfully and lovingly live into the progress of the Coronavirus reality, let's take time—time to honor the steps of our **grad**uates, and the time to honor the **grad**ual steps into a better reality.

Pentecost and Fire of the Holy Spirit, May 31st, 2020

In the Old Testament, Pentecost celebrated God's gift of the ten commandments to Moses. **The first Pentecostal feast took place 50 days after Passover.** In the New Testament, the Pentecostal feast took on new meaning as the coming of the Holy Spirit to Jesus' disciples, as he had foretold them. This was the final fulfillment of Jesus' mission and the beginning of the disciples preaching about Jesus as the risen Christ. Pentecost is known as the birthday of the Church.

Liturgical Colors

Red is the color for Pentecost to celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. Following Pentecost Sunday, the liturgical color will be green, the color of Ordinary Time. Except for Trinity Sunday on June 7 when the color is white, the color will be green until late November when white will celebrate Christ the King Sunday followed by the Advent Season when we will change to the color purple.

2. Has no one with whom to Associate

Well, she can still study and teach. Every week I prepare a lecture on a chapter of First Corinthians; we've covered 8 already and there are 8 more to go. It is challenging to teach to an iPod, but I'm becoming more comfortable and I really do enjoy presenting the material. Plus, there is the advantage of seeing the guy behind the iPod...I know George's non-verbal communication so I can tell when I'm dwelling too long on a thought or when I ought to share even more. Though silent, I do have an audience of one and that's helpful. Thus, my preparation is about the same – usually 6 hours per session. On the other hand, there is far less physical energy to expend: no tables and chairs to arrange, no sound system to set up, no papers to pass out, no coffee to make. But, sadly, there are no cookies to share, no "Happy Birthdays" to sing, no catching up with the weekly threads of conversation that bind us together. I'm grateful for each phone call or email that reminds me the Wednesday Bible Study is still alive and well.

And, although there are no worship services to assist in planning or leading, I've got a new rhythm of preparing and taping morning devotions. This type of praying with and for our scattered community (and their friends and relatives) undergirds my practice of



ministry. Usually, I read these lessons and pray these prayers in the comfort of my morning chair and often quite early, before dawn. But now, I'm reading and praying in advance...and doing so with an intention of steadying and challenging others into the new day. Last week we experimented with taping the devotions outside to the added

enhancement of birdsongs, an occasional roar from not too distant I-40, our neighbor's dog barking...and of course: the wind/spirit/breath! The change in setting added a new dimension of beauty. I believe it is helpful.

Upon my ministry plate are also the larger than Second groups I work with. I call these my "cottage ministries" as they are small projects done with others or on my own:

• New Mexico Pilgrimage for Unity: The Steering Team cancelled the 2020 three-day Pilgrimage, but plan on offering other events of pilgrimage and unity. The first will be a self-guided Pilgrimage on the day before Pentecost (May 30); resources for praying while walking will be provided, as well as a videoconference (via Zoom) orientation on the evening before and a closing Zoom worship on Saturday evening.



- Committee on Ministry (COM): I'm assisting First Presbyterian of Aztec as they complete their Ministry Information Form and begin a search for a new pastor; I continue to check in with their Interim, Rev. Charlie Packard, who is doing an excellent job of offering worship and community connections during this COVID-19 health emergency. There are occasional small group Zoom meetings and a monthly business meeting. Though slowly, the work of COM continues. This month I'm working with a circle of pastors to reflect on what they have learned during this demanding season...and to identify the sparks of energy for the next unknown phase of ministry. I'm really looking forward to collecting stories, images and ideas to share with the Presbytery leaders and with these "season of reflection" participants.
- New Mexico Conference of Churches: I have less to do...as we just initiated a process of discernment on identity and purpose; this work is led by a consultant. So, I do a little consulting with the consultant; encourage the judicatory heads and their deputies (all are offering fantastic resources to their denominational congregations); and try to offer inspiration through Constant Contact missives to our mailing list.

So, there you have it! This is what a Parish Associate does when she

Thinking to myself: ...how much I miss my Second Church friends, our Pastor Rob and church staff: Karmen, Susie and Francis, Beverly, and Frank, our custodian. Our Parish Associate, Kay Huggins, keeps us connected through her online Wednesday Bible Study and daily devotions. Additionally, Pastor Rob posts a weekly on-line communication to keep us updated. Recently, a "Second Pres. Fellowship Group" was created to encourage our members to post a personal greeting, as well as sharing our daily personal sequestered experiences. However, I am concerned that those members who do not have internet capability are missing out. I am pleased that our Dedicated Deacons are printing some of the electronic messages and sending via USPS to Furthest Pew members and others they know do not have internet. I encourage all of you to pick up the phone and check in on our friends or drop off a note — easy to do and we certainly have the time.

Stewardship: Thanks to all of you for your faithful and continuing financial support to the church by mailing in your checks. Our designated offering counters continue to record your giving and make the bank deposits. You may continue to mail in your checks to the church or to a newly

Online Sunday Worship: The realization that we have not physically congregated to worship since the third Sunday of Lent, boggles my mind! We are blessed to be called to online worship every Sunday morning by a team of clergy and laity from the Presbytery of Santa Fe. Please join in by reading the Presbytery of Santa Fe website for more information.

Presbytery of Santa Fe Summer meeting Is scheduled to gather in Las Vegas, NM, on Saturday, July 18. However, at this time it is uncertain whether we will meet in person or conduct our business via videoconference. Planning is ongoing!

Presbytery Logo: One of the issues on the July agenda will be further discussion on a new logo design to replace the current one which has been in use for the past 40 years. At the annual meeting last October, the Presbytery, following extensive discussion, voted to retire the current logo which incorporates the Zia sun symbol with a Celtic cross superimposed over it. The need for a new design resulted from the study conducted by congregations in our Presbytery and the Presbyterian Church (USA) on The Doctrine of Discovery, (a review of its origins and implications for congregations in the PC(USA), and support for Native American Sovereignty). The Zia sun symbol is sacred to the people at Zia Pueblo, and recently, leaders from Zia have been asking groups that use the symbol to do so respectfully or to cease its use. Holding true to our Presbyterian way of doing business, a committee was appointed to visit with the leadership at Zia Pueblo, who told us that they had no problem with our use of the sun symbol, but the way it is currently depicted with 3 arms instead of 4, is incomplete, as the sun symbol "is a symbol of wholeness", and the Presbytery's design is not. They were very clear in saying that their Native traditions and Christianity should be compatible so that we can walk the same journey. Presbytery Moderator, Rev. Seth Finch, invited all the churches in the Presbytery to participate in designing a new logo and to submit their ideas at the February meeting of this year. At that meeting, the sixteen drawings that were submitted were narrowed down to a few, and the finalists will be voted on at the July meeting.

224 General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) will be held in Baltimore, MD, June 20-27, assuming all will be clear to gather together. Commissioners from our Presbytery will be: Minister Commissioner: Rev. Tom Hart; Elder Commissioner, Ruling Elder Nelson Capitan; Youth Advisory Delegate: Derek Capitan.

Greetings to each and every one of you. We are certainly maneuvering through uncharted times and territory.

As many of you already know, Family Promise of Albuquerque has created a shelter in place at one of our local congregations for the 3 families/14 people who are currently in the shelter

program. In order to protect our families and our volunteers we increased hours for all staff to cover the shelter 24/7. We are also still trying to meet the needs of our graduated and wait-list guests. As you can imagine this is very challenging in these times, but we are committed to the families that we serve.

Just like many people joke about the weight they are gaining due to the stay at home order, our families are also facing this. We have got donations of exercise equipment and many of the families are remaining active. The emotional roller coaster that you all are riding with the uncertainty of when all this will end and we can begin creating our new normal, our families are facing that double as they have been riding a similar roller coaster due to their situation of homelessness. Sometimes you just want to get off the ride. Thankfully we have a strong staff that is supporting our families through this. It is also difficult to provide families with enough to do during the day. Craft and project ideas and supplies are greatly appreciated at this time. Being under a shelter in place has its challenges for all of us. As we all try to maneuver through these uncharted waters we ask you to keep the staff and families we serve in your thoughts and prayers.
